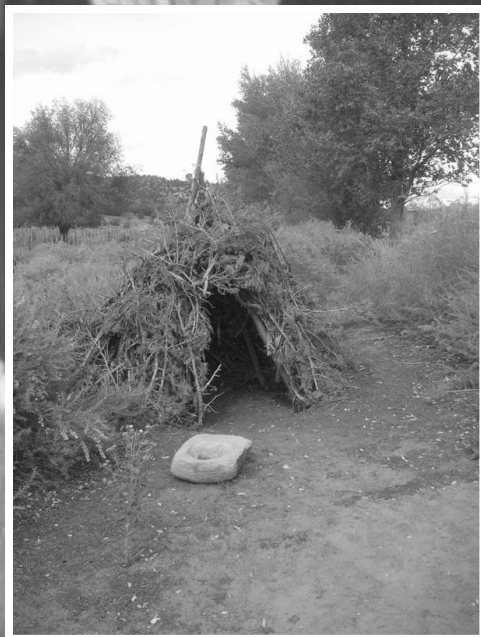


**Tour Tip:** *Tour #3 includes a trip into living history at the Pipe Spring Monument*

**A**lthough their way of life was greatly impacted by the Mormon presence at Pipe Spring, the Paiute Indians continued to live in the area and by 1907 the Kaibab Paiute Indian Reservation was established, surrounding the privately owned Pipe Spring ranch. In 1923 the Pipe Spring ranch was purchased and set aside as a national monument. Today a visitor center and museum (developed in partnership with the Kaibab Band of Paiute Indians), tours of Winsor Castle, summer "living history" demonstrations, an orchard and garden, horses, longhorns and chickens, and a half-mile trail offer a glimpse of American Indian and pioneer life in the Old West.



A visit to Pipe Spring National Monument provides visitors with glimpses of both pioneer and Southern Paiute life. The museum features displays of baskets, pottery, clothing and tools.
